

# Stakeholder Engagement Guide

Stakeholder engagement is a complex process of engaging the key individuals, organizations or institutions that can affect the desired policy. It involves stakeholder 1) analysis and 2) mapping.

# **Stakeholder Analysis**

Stakeholder analysis is a systematic process of identifying and assessing individuals, groups, organizations, and institutions that have an interest or influence on child survival. The purpose of stakeholder analysis is to gain a comprehensive understanding of who the key players are and how they can impact child survival.

Stakeholder analysis can be conducted following five key steps.

- 1. **Identification –** Identify the relevant stakeholders involved in child survival, including governmental bodies, NGOs, healthcare professionals, parents, community leaders, media outlets, donors, UN agencies etc.
- 2. **Categorization –** Categorize stakeholders based on their level of influence, interest, and potential impact on child survival. Stakeholders can be categorized as primary (directly affected by the issue), secondary (indirectly affected), and tertiary (external influences).
- Assessment Evaluate each stakeholder's interests, concerns, and positions related to child survival. Consider their potential support, opposition, or neutrality toward proposed advocacy efforts.
- 4. **Influence and Power** Determine the level of influence and power each stakeholder possesses. This could include factors such as financial resources, expertise, decision-making authority, and public credibility.
- 5. Alliances and Coalition Identify potential allies and coalitions among stakeholders who share common goals and interests related to child survival advocacy.

## Stakeholder Mapping

Stakeholder mapping is a visual representation of stakeholder analysis. It involves creating a visual diagram that shows the relationships between stakeholders, their positions, and their level of influence.



Stakeholder mapping provides a clearer picture of the advocacy landscape and helps identify strategies for engagement. It also helps to identify which stakeholders to prioritize.

There are different ways to map stakeholders, but a common approach involves using a matrix with axes representing influence/power and interest/support for child survival.

Stakeholder mapping will need to be done for each specific advocacy goal as the level of influence and interest will be different for each stakeholder for each cause.

High Influence/High Interest	High Influence/ Low Interest
These stakeholders have a significant impact on child survival and are deeply invested in the issue. They might include the Ministry of Health, international NGOs, UN agencies, and influential media outlets. Engaging and forming partnerships with these stakeholders could have a major positive impact on the advocacy efforts.	These stakeholders have the potential to exert influence but may not have a direct interest in child survival advocacy. Engaging them strategically could help garner support and resources, even though child survival might not be their primary focus.
Low influence/High Interest	Low influence/Low interest
These stakeholders have limited influence and interest in child survival advocacy. While their direct impact might be low, they can still play a role in spreading awareness and supporting the cause at a grassroots level.	These stakeholders have minimal influence or interest in child survival advocacy. While their impact might be limited, they can contribute to raising general awareness among the broader public.

Tips for completing conducting stakeholder mapping.

- For each stakeholder ensure you understand their leverage point they can use to influence policy change.
- To make the tool more useful, identify the specific individuals within those organizations that you want to engage as part of the advocacy.
- Each of these quadrants will be useful depending on 1) what you hope to achieve 2) at specific times of your advocacy strategy. For instance, if you plan to build momentum and support, you may consider starting by engaging low influence but high interest groups such as community leaders to echo their support for increased budgets for child health before you engage the high influence/interest players such as the ministry of health officials.

## Advocating to Lawmakers

Lawmakers play a critical role in elevating child health which helps to accelerate progress towards the attainment of child survival goals. Lawmakers enact legislation, consider and approve budgets, and provide oversight for government accountability and transparency.



Engaging lawmakers and increasing the level of debate and dialogue on child survival encourages a whole-of-government approach to child survival, putting the topic more firmly on the radar of related line ministries such as finance, local government, planning and economic development, water and sanitation, women, etc.

Lawmakers can also engage at the regional level to exchange ideas, build political will, strengthen capacity, and foster collaboration.

# Example Letter to a Member of Parliament in Sierra Leone

Dear [Lawmaker's Name],

I hope this letter finds you well. I am writing to urge you to prioritize child survival in Sierra Leone for the betterment of our nation's future. The challenges we face in ensuring the survival of our children are immense, but with focused efforts and strategic investments, we can make significant progress in this critical area.

Child and maternal mortality rates in Sierra Leone are among the highest in the world, exacerbated by the looming threat of malaria, especially for children under five years of age. Shockingly, approximately 70% of under-five deaths occur during infancy through early childhood (1 – 59 months). This alarming statistic underscores the urgency of our cause.

It is heartening to note that at the 75th World Health Assembly, Sierra Leone and Tanzania jointly hosted discussions to reaffirm our commitment to child survival, aligning with SDG 3.2.1. Such global commitments are essential in our pursuit of a brighter future for our children.

The recent government transition introduced the 2019-2023 Medium-Term National Development Plan, which places healthcare funding at 15% of the budget, reinforcing the Free Healthcare Initiative. This is a significant step towards improving healthcare access and child survival in our country.

Additionally, Sierra Leone's potential engagement in the World Bank's Human Capital Development Project holds promise for advancements in child health, education, and nutrition. These initiatives offer us a unique opportunity to uplift our nation's children.

Despite our progress, we face substantial challenges in ensuring child survival. Malaria remains the leading cause of child mortality, particularly in rural areas with limited access to healthcare services, including immunization, safe water, hygiene, and sanitation. Our health infrastructure is in dire need of improvement, and the 2015 Ebola outbreak exposed the vulnerabilities in our healthcare system, necessitating a re-evaluation of our long-term health programs.

In light of these challenges and opportunities, I implore you to advocate policies that prioritize child survival in Sierra Leone. We ask you to advocate for the Ministry of Finance to meet 100% the requested budget by the new launched Child Health program that will drive progress towards reducing child deaths in Sierra Leone.

I trust in your commitment to the well-being of our citizens, especially our children, and I look forward to witnessing positive changes that will benefit generations to come. Thank you for your attention to this vital matter.
